In Swahili it roughly translates to people belping people. And since 1972 the 16 men and women have done just that. Their targets have mostly been black teenagers, helping youths to a better education, to a better understanding of the world beyond San Bernardino and to a better life. "We try to expose them to things they normally would not see," said Wilbur Brown, Kutania president and one of the group's founders. Kutania People is an all-volunteer organization located in a small, blue wood-frame house at 1117 Lincoln Ave. The group receives no federal aid.

With the organization, teenagers attend plays in Los Angeles, meet and talk to local and state politicians and volunteer to help other community-based organizations. Kutania People was started here in 1972 by eight young, college:

Top black athlete to be named

The Black Athletes Hall of Fame Dinner, one of the big social events during the year in San Bernardino, promises to even out-do last year's glittering affair, when it's held Saturday at 7:30 p.m. in the City Hall's Convention Center.

Pro stars Marv Fleming and Wayne Embree headed the 1974 honored guest list when USC's Shelton Diggs received the coveted Tom Hester Memorial Award as top athlete in the city schools for the 1972-73 term.

Famed boxer Ken Norton, 26-foot long jumper Randy Williams, the San Diego Chargers' Bob Howard and the Trojans' Rose Bowl starters Ron Bush and Diggs will attend for sure. There's still hope that All-American Anthony Davis and the Rams' James Harris and Isaih Robertson can make it.

The high point of the evening will be naming the 1974 winner of the Hester Award, with such ex-prep stars as Willie Beamon (SBHS and now at UCLA), Greg Bunch (Pacific and Cal State Fullerton) and Leon Jordan (San Gorgonio and Oregon State) in hot contention.

In addition, there may be a name or two added to the Black Hall of Fame, which takes in athletes who exceled in two or more sports and have been out of high school at least five years.

The select group has only seven honorees now, including Hester who was killed in an auto accident just when he was embarking on a great football-track career at Arizona State.

The others are Horace (Junior) Howard, Andy Brown, Atwood (Sonny) Grandberry and Earnist McMurray of SBHS, and Pacific's Homer Robertson and Charles Tribble. The selection committee consists of Art Davis, George Hunn, Al Jury, Chuck Lewis, Ludie Taylor and Eddie Wilson.

The dinner, which has the theme "Spotlight on Champions," is presented by the Kutania People and the Sportsmen Athletic Club, with Wilbur Brown and Leonard Jacks serving as respective chairmen. George Hughley will be the keynote speaker, and tickets are available from members of the two clubs.



age of role models for black set an age limit for its members at 35 years. "We were all young then and we thought we'd never see 35," said the 37-year-old Brown with a smile.

The age limit requirement was dropped.

Said Brown: "We wanted to keep the organization young in character and philosophy.

The organization's most successful program is its intern program, which encourages teenagers to get involved with community volunteer efforts and pursue higher academic and vocational

Each year Kutania People's intern program counsels about 18 teenagers from local high schools.

The students have varied backgrounds. Some achieve outstanding grades while others are receiving poor grades. Some come from broken homes and are on the verge of dropping out of school; others come from stable, middleclass families.

But despite these differences the youths care about each other and help one another out. Brown said.

Most of the 140 students who have completed the intern program since 1974 have gone on to colleges and vocational schools. The organization helps ease the financial burden of school by offering modest scholarships to some of the students.

Many of the students keep in touch with Kutania members to tell of success and problems.

When people need help the group is there.
